From shaving their heads to just bonding as a team, the men's Little Giant swim team had their second undefeated season in a row this year. The new pool has been a great help to the whole team. From waking up for school and keeping up with the honor roll, Fahrbach still finds the time to juggle in a couple 100 yards of swimming five days a week.

## Ruffing to State



Beth Ruffing is an agriculture student and Historian of the Fremont FFA Chapter. The Ruffing Family suffered a devastating loss on August 15, 2002 when Jon Paul Ruffing was killed in a tragic farming accident.

Beth
and Jon were both members of the Townsend Blue Ribbon Boys 4-H club, and the group began to organize a memorial on Jon's behalf. With the help of many advisors, parents, clubs, and donors the "Jon's Dream" barn was constructed at the Sandusky County Fairgrounds.

On the way to the 2006 National FFA Convention, Beth rode on the charter bus with Steven Hoffman, a member of the Clyde FFA Chapter. Steven and Beth grew to share a common bond because Steven's older brother Joe was killed on October 6 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, 2000 in an agricultural accident. Beth and Steven
decided to share stories, feelings and memories with each other and began gathering information to write a prepared speech that Beth would present.

As a result of their efforts, Beth has a tremendous message about the importance of agricultural safety, and the credibility of the life experience to deliver the information to groups of all ages.

Beth placed first in the advanced prepare public speaking contest at the sub-district level and second at the district four contest. As a result, she has qualified as one of the top 20 prepared speakers in the state of Ohio.

The state speaking contest is March $17^{\text {th }}$ at The Ohio State University. If Beth wins the state contest, she would present her speech at the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis in October of 2007.

## Otis has Heart

In February the $5^{\text {th }}$ grade students at Otis School sent 46 boxes filled with toiletries, candies and valentines to local military personnel serving in the Middle East and overseas. Mrs. Moran, a fifth grade teacher, and Mrs. Mary Lou Cooper, a retired Otis cafeteria supervisor, coordinated this project.

Names of service people were solicited from the Otis School population, churches, community members responding to an article in "Heard on the Street" and John Schell whose unit is now on active duty in the Middle East. Their goal was to personalize each box with a specific soldier's name.

The Post Office supplied them with the boxes and labels with no charge to them; however, the cost per box to ship was $\$ 8.10$. Otis School asked its students. parents and general population, along with the Fremont Community to sponsor a box. The response was overwhelming and all the boxes were paid for and sponsored by specific
individuals. Residents were calling Otis the day the boxes were to be shipped, asking if they still needed money to ship the boxes. Those
students helped deliver the boxes.

The response from the soldiers has been very encouraging. For example, Mrs. Teri
