

## Calamity Day Update

As of March 31, 2014, schools have been closed due to inclement weather fourteen (14) days this school year. The State of Ohio currently allows districts to use five (5) calamity days without penalty. Recently, legislators approved an additional four (4) days for this year only, and the district is utilizing "blizzard bags" which gives us an extra three (3) days. Simply put, the district will now need to make up two (2) days due to inclement weather. Our revised last day of school information is listed below.

## Reciprocal Teaching at Otis

What strategies do you use to comprehend text? Ask third graders in Mrs. Lozano's Title I program and they will tell you they have learned four important strategies: predict, ask questions, clarify, and summarize. These four strategies help students monitor their reading comprehension. According to the creators of reciprocal teaching, Palincsar and Brown (1986), this powerful teaching technique is especially effective when incorporated as an intervention for struggling readers.
 During literature circles, students take on the roles of the predictor, questioner, clarifier, and summarizer as they construct together the meaning of a text while deepening their understanding of the four strategies. How do the students feel about reciprocal teaching? "It helps me to remember what I read" and "It's a fun way to learn because we use props" and "We get to talk about what we read!" ## Think about Eligibility....NOW

As students enter into the final grading period of the 2013-2014 school year, it is important to remember the academic success or shortcomings experienced during this time will directly impact a child's athletic eligibility for the Fall of 2014. In order for a current high school student to maintain their athletic eligibility through the summer, they will need to carry and pass a minimum of $51 / 2$ credit courses

In addition, each student will need to carry a 1.5 GPA for the fourth grading period as well as receive no more than one failing grade. Students at the middle school will be required to maintain a 1.5 GPA during their final trimester as well as receiving passing grades in five of their classes.

It is also important to remember for all students, in both the high school as well middle school, the final grading period will determine their eligibility for the fall - summer school work does not count towards a student's athletic eligibility.

## A Partnership between the City of Fremont and Fremont City Schools

The Safe Routes to Schools grant application has been submitted to the Ohio Department of Transportation. If funded, Fremont will receive approximately \$400,000 for additional sidewalks, school zone beacons, speed feedback signs, pedestrian crossing signage with countdown times and newly painted crosswalks around the Atkinson, Croghan, Hayes, Otis, Stamm and FMS school communities. Additionally, all students in grades K-8 will be provided additional bicycle/walking safety programming and recreational opportunities. The goal of the Safe Routes to Schools program is to create ways for children to travel safely to and from their schools. Additionally, the program aims to increase the physical activity of its children, thus improving the overall wellness of students as well as staff and community members.
