The Importance of Reading

The ability to read is the foundation of learning. Research shows that children who are not reading at a third grade level by the end of grade three are more likely to struggle in subjects in the older grades. Fremont City Schools is committed to supporting our children to provide a strong academic foundation.

Ohio's new Third Grade Reading Guarantee directs schools to identify which students in kindergarten through grade three are having trouble reading and provide extra reading help right away. The goal is to get these boys and girls caught up in reading as soon as possible. Studies show that children who are behind in reading at the end of grade three will have a hard time in all subjects in the fourth grade and beyond.

Under the Third Grade Reading Guarantee, Fremont City Schools will determine at the start of each year how well each child in kindergarten through grade three is reading. We will then create a special reading plan for each child who is behind. Parents are an important part of the plan and the school will reach out to you to be a part of the Reading Improvement and Monitoring Plan (RIMP). Teachers who are experienced in teaching reading will work with these students.

If you have a son or daughter who still struggles with reading at the end of the grade three, we will talk with you about keeping the child in third grade until he or she catches up. If your child is retained in grade three for reading instruction, they may still be able to complete fourth-grade work in other subjects.

There are special rules about the guarantee that can help children who are still learning English and children who have disabilities. Lutz Has Heart

The difference between hearing and listening is covered with the students in a resource room at Lutz Elementary School. The students learn the behaviors that are important to have effective listening, which leads to showing appropriate social skills and good character. A unit was taught on "Whole Body Listening." Whole Body Listening is a holistic approach to listening. A person should not just use their ears when listening, but they should also use their eyes, mouth, hands, feet, brain, and heart. When the students are taught to listen with their heart, they show the speaker that they care about what they are saying. The students were given direct instruction, along with plenty of modeling, and role-playing to encourage them to use this approach in the classroom.



Each day throughout the unit, the students enjoyed playing the game, "The Hokey Pokey" when

the lessons were over, which they now relate to listening by putting their "whole body in" when listening to a teacher or speaker. When asked where else they can show the good character trait of listening in other settings, among many replies, one student said, "In church." while another student said, "I can use whole body listening when I'm listening at home." The students are able to self-regulate and identify how well they are listening to a teacher or speaker by using a rubric. The rubric helps them to identify which level they are on. After identifying which level they are on, they are able to tell if they are showing the good character trait of being an exceptional listener.
