#### **Testing at Ross**



Ross High will be administering the Explore and PLAN tests to all freshman and sophomore students on Wednesday, October 16<sup>th</sup>. The freshmen will be taking the Explore while the sophomores take the PLAN. These tests are valuable tools which can be used to prepare students for their ACT, as well as, discover the student's possible

career interests. Ross will be operating on an early release schedule to accommodate the testing of both classes of students on that day. All students will report to school at the regular time (7:30). Juniors and Seniors NOT being tested will leave for the day at 10:44. There is no cost to the student for taking either test. Results will be distributed and explained to the students by their guidance counselor in English classes shortly after the results are received. Students are expected to bring home the results packet of information detailing their scores, and what he or she can do to improve, to their parents. #### Mission: Multiplication is a Success



Fremont City Schools presents Mission: Multiplication as an initiative to motivate students to become agents for their own success in a district-wide mission to improve mathematics performance. Proficiency with basic multiplication and division facts is extremely important because it is the cornerstone for building higher mathematics skills. Fifth graders are required to meet efficient skill levels with basic multiplication facts to qualify for participation in the Mission: Accomplished event.

Students were treated to a half day of activities at the Fremont Recreation Center, as well as, a pizza pic-

nic lunch. Activities included volleyball, basketball, corn hole, parachute, cup stacking, bingo, Twister and "Let's Dance" from X-Box. The Leadership Course from Ross High School provided thirty-seven PROPS squad students to help lead the activities.

#### **Playing Games to Learn at FMS**


#### **Welcome to Washington!**

### **Positive Behavior Interventions and Support**

What should I see in the school buildings supporting positive student behavior? In Fremont City Schools, we support our students' positive behavior by our expectations: *Be Safe, Be Responsible, and Be Respectful.* These three high expectations promote safety and learning for all students. The school-wide plan is known as PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports). It is based on the idea that students learn best when taught clear behavior expectations and when provided with predictable responses.

This 2013-14 academic year, Hayes, Lutz, Otis, and Stamm Elementary staff have begun implementing a school-wide behavior plan. Visual reminders prompt students to remember these expectations. Framed posters *Be Safe, Responsible, and Be Respectful,* with Fremont City School logo, and photos of our students help connect each building to the district-wide expectations. Each building also has a matrix posted. A matrix is a chart of what behavior is expected in each area of the building. Sometimes, a colored chart is displayed to remind students how softly to talk in an area of the building.

Similarly, classroom settings have their own matrix and some classrooms also have a chart to help students understand how softly/loudly to speak. Many teachers have a classroom system of discipline that coordinates with the matrix, perhaps a color-coded chart where student clips indicate their behavior at any given time.

So far, this article has described visual supports as what you would see in buildings using PBIS. You would also see and hear students being acknowledged for good behavior. You may see teachers cuing students on the expected behavior. There may be a bulletin board set aside to recognize student behavior. You may even see a student report to the principal's office as a reward for good behavior!

What about our other school buildings? Atkinson, Croghan, Washington, and FMS staff is all beginning the process of designing their programs. We can look forward to seeing the visual supports showing up in these buildings.

Once buildings are implementing PBIS well, and this takes time and practice, you would not notice much more about behavior. But you would notice the well-run classrooms in which student learning is occurring!

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
