
Happy New Year and welcome to 2017!

Pairs of students have chosen a specific country and are researching that country's holiday traditions. They are incorporating their research into a





The Kingdom of "NG"

First graders at Atkinson have recently spent some time in the Kingdom of NG. While learning how to read and write words that end in -ng, students met some royalty in the kingdom. They learned about King ING, Queen ONG, Prince ANG, and Princess UNG. Each member of the Kingdom of NG makes a different sound because of the vowel that is in front of ng. Students learned a phonics dance chant to help them remember what each member says and also made crowns for the royalty they wanted to pretend they were. Students decorated

the crown with words which had the same sound as the member of the kingdom they chose.



Learning to read and understanding all of the different sounds that help us to read can be a daunting task. The first grade teachers at Atkinson have discovered through training with Phonics First, an Orton Gillingham phonics approach, that using numerous senses help students to retain the sounds they see in words and help students become better decoders, which leads to better readers. We have implemented this approach in our teaching by incorporating, songs, movements, finger tap spelling, and sensory learning of word wall words. These



are activities where students are touching, hearing, feeling, smelling, and at times, tasting to help them learn. The main goal is to use activities where students are taking part in their learning. Fremont City Schools 500 W. State Street, Suite A Fremont, Ohio 43420



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Great Books Foster Lively Discussions

Junior Great Books (JGB) centers on the idea of using shared inquiry discussions to promote critical thinking and comprehension. It provides the students with the skills to dissect, find meaning, and explore new ideas and information found in their readings. To do this, the students read the story multiple times, each time with a set task to aid in better comprehension. The task varies depending on the story.

The students are then asked an interpretive question - a question with more than one PLAUSIBLE answer that is not found directly in the text. They are to answer the question citing evidence that makes sense to them.

Lastly, the teacher hosts a discussion where the students answer the interpretive question and multiple other cluster questions. (The teacher's role is simply to ask students to clarify their answer and facilitate cluster questions - no hand raising and no direct answering to the teacher...they just keep the discussion

going using good manners). The cluster questions all focus on finding evidence from the text that makes sense to them, that may aid them in finding a better or different answer to the initial interpretive question.

The discussion ends up looking a little like a debate, where students can agree or disagree as long as they have sound reasoning for explaining their answer. A lot of their discussions end up being quite profound, and they often wind up changing their initial ideas about the story, or adding to them, based on the conversation with their peers.

The students focus one story at a time, but each story is connected to an overarching theme. In this instance, the students were wrapping up our theme of trust. They had read three stories that exemplified this in different ways. They had their three discussions. To make text to text connections and comparisons, the students were given the task to analyze the characters from all three stories. Their job was to find ways the characters demonstrated trust. This included things the characters said and did (actions and words). Once they found their examples, they were asked to create a "Super Character" of trust. They put together their super character by giving him actions and words that would demonstrate trust just like the characters from our story.

Modified Master Facilities Plan

Since September of 2015, residents of the Fremont City Schools District have been engaged in an open community conversation about school facilities. The conversations were designed to discuss the current conditions of the school facilities; the impact the conditions of those facilities has on teaching and learning; and the suggestions for addressing the deteriorating and outdated infrastructures.

The educational problems being generated by our current school facilities include lack of classroom technology due to inadequate electrical capacity, insufficient space for effective teaching and learning, hot and cold classroom temperatures that interrupt classroom instruction and health and safety issues due to poor ventilation, moisture and mold.

Based on the feedback from the community conversations, a Master Facilities Plan was developed and a 4.99 mill bond levy was placed on the General Election ballot. On November 8, 2016, the majority of voters rejected the bond levy. As a result, the poor conditions of the schools still exist and must be addressed by taking other actions.

After the election, the Fremont City Schools Board of Education sent a letter to every household in the community asking what they liked about the November 2016 Master Facilities Plan and what changes they would like the Board of Education to consider. Listed below is a summary of the recent survey results:

- More than half of survey responders (51%) stated they would support the November 2016 Master Facilities Plan.
- One out of three residents said that the November 2016 Master Facilities Plan included too many elementary buildings.
- There is widespread community support for eliminating the Washington site as a location for a new elementary building.
- Many residents also asked the Board of Education to eliminate some of the other costs to make the new Master Facilities Plan more cost effective.

On December 19, 2016, the Board of Education approved a modified Master Facilities Plan to place on the May 2, 2017 ballot. The proposed plan includes new elementary buildings at the Atkinson, Croghan, Lutz and Otis sites and a new Ross High School that includes an auditorium to accommodate the District's performing arts courses and extracurricular programming.

Based on the recent survey results, the District eliminated the new elementary building at Washington and the additional classroom space in all buildings. Simply put, the District will reduce the current number of elementary buildings from seven schools to four schools and taxpayers will not be asked to provide monies for extra space within the new buildings.

The Ohio Facilities Construction Commission will fund 49% of the total cost for the new elementary schools and Ross High School.

Additional information about the upcoming bond levy will be shared in the near future.

Dr. Traci McCaudy To Retire July 31, 2017 Dr. Traci L. McCaudy Superintendent Amelia R. Gioffredo Treasurer

Dr. Traci McCaudy, Superintendent of Fremont City Schools, will retire at the end of her current contract after eleven years of dedicated and successful service to the parents and children of Fremont, Ohio. Her final day as Superintendent will be July 31, 2017.

Alex Gorobetz, President of the Fremont Board of Education, praised McCaudy's leadership, work ethic and dedication to Fremont. "Dr. McCaudy's tenure as Superintendent of Fremont City Schools has been extraordinary. Inheriting a district which was in a constant state of "fiscal caution," Dr. McCaudy implemented many cost saving measures and difficult staff reductions, which resulted in financial solvency over an eleven year period of time, even in the face of numerous funding reductions from the state. Much of the savings has been subsequently invested in classroom instruction, resulting in much improved technological opportunities for students as well as up-to-date materials and curricula. She also implemented many school safety measures, drug prevention programs, a sensible dress code for students, many diverse learning opportunities for students and reasonable accountability standards for students and staff. During Dr. McCaudy's tenure, the district built a new middle school and achieved an "excellent" performance rating from the Ohio Department of Education. Dr. McCaudy made Fremont City Schools an integral part of the Fremont community, and her work and tireless efforts will be sorely missed."

Fremont City Schools has received state-wide recognition for its accomplishments during Dr. McCaudy's work in Fremont, including Certificates of Commendation on three occasions from the Ohio Department of Education and the Chamber of Commerce of Sandusky County Health and Wellness Award. Personally, she has been presented the prestigious Betsy M. Cowles Women in Leadership Award from the Buckeye Association of School Administrators and a Certificate of Recognition from the Ohio State Board of Education for receiving that award. She also earned the Northwest Region "Who's Who Excellence Award for Outstanding Leaders" from the Ohio School Boards Association.

Dr. McCaudy has been a featured presenter at state and regional conferences and serves on several state committees, including the BASA State Policy Committee, the State Superintendent's Advisory Committee and the Ohio Public School Advocacy Network Leadership Team.

She is also a member of the Fremont Rotary Club, co-chairs the Fremont Rotary STRIVE Program and serves on the Rotary Literacy Committee. McCaudy also is a member of Health Partners of Sandusky County and Sandusky County's Family and Children First Council. She is a past trustee of the Sandusky County Chamber of Commerce and actively participates in many local events and initiatives.

Dr. McCaudy's 31 year career in public education includes positions as an Intervention Specialist, Lead Teacher, Assistant Principal, Elementary and Middle School Building Principal, Executive Director of Strategic Planning and Programming and Superintendent of Schools.
