The "old" Ross served its purpose for many years until it could no longer meet the demands and needs of its occupants. As the custodians strive to maintain the pristine look of the "new" Ross, they notice how big and spacious it is. Once the routine is down, it has become much easier for them to clean daily. Being able to have a working climate control system is another bonus for everyone.

Some said that the old building felt cold, dark, and depressing, while other students commented that the old building made them feel like they "did not want to come to school." The "new" Ross is gorgeous. It is bright and well lit. The hallways are wide. The classrooms are spacious. "There are doors on the bathroom stalls," remarked several students. "Students are more motivated and want to come to school" because the learning environment "just feels better; it's more fun." With the attendance rate improving over 3% since coming to the new building, students report that there is a general feeling that they really are "more motivated" and that they really "want to be in school."

Students are enjoying the bigger desks and flexible seating, not only in the classroom, but also in the community areas located throughout the spacious building. There are large screen interactive panels for teachers to be able to bring a lesson to life and teach in the moment. The small group breakout rooms allow for more individualized instruction, peer

interaction, and quiet testing areas. Band students comment how the entire percussion section can finally fit on stage without being crammed in or off to the side. The acoustics in the music rooms, in the Performing Arts Center, and even in the cafeteria/commons area are state of the art. Students also remark how they enjoy having all of their academics located in one area of the building and their performance, elective courses in an entirely different section of the building. The added auxiliary gym, in addition to the competition gym, has allowed for physical education classes to continue throughout the day while other events take place; Bloodmobile, ACT testing, photos, and so much more.

Getting to know a new building with all the added bonuses and technology has been a learning experience. There have been, and will continue to be, kinks in the system along the way but one thing is certain: students and staff continue to learn the real meaning of the phrase "Once a Little Giant, Always a Little Giant." They have experienced first-hand that they're "all in this together."

One comment that has been made by numerous students, and even staff members, is that they feel that being in the new building is "like a scene out of 'High School Musical". Some feel that they will wake up from the dream and that they will be back in a dark and dreary building. The dream of having a bright, new spacious building to meet the learning needs of all students has finally happened, thanks to the generous community of Fremont.



### **FRACTION SKILLS**

**LUTZ ELEMENTARY SCHOOL** 



Third grade students from Ms. Morris' class at Lutz School have been practicing their fraction skills.

As an introductory activity, students began by rolling two dice. They wrote the smaller number as the numerator and the larger number as the denominator.

Students then used different colored counters to create the fraction. They used red counters for the denominator and then flipped the correct amount of counters to yellow for the numerator.

Students finished up the activity by dividing shapes into equal parts and shading in parts to create the correct fraction. In the end, students had equal parts of fun and learning.

### **CELEBRATING DR. SEUSS**


#### **ATKINSON ELEMENTARY**

His birthday now coincides with National Read Across America Day. For Read Across America Day, the staff and students held a "Read Across Atkinson Day"!

For 10 minutes at a time, each class traveled to a different location throughout the building to read. Some classes went to the cafeteria, others read in the hallways, and some even sat on the stairs! After 10 minutes, everyone moved to a new location to read.

They did this a total of three times which equaled a half an hour of reading. Some classes chose to silent read in their spots, while others were read to by their teacher. The staff and students enjoyed this school-wide activity!
