

FREMONT AREA FOUNDATION

In early 2000, it became evident that the community of Fremont was not able to operate independently with respect to athletic facilities shared by our local public and parochial schools. As such, the Fremont Area Athletic Foundation was formed, currently named, the Fremont Area Foundation. This Foundation was formed to pool resources in order to focus all efforts in repairing and rebuilding the area facilities with private, state and/or local dollars.

Under the leadership of the foundation, a 501c3 corporation, many subcommittees have advanced on a broad front. Collectively, the completed projects include:

- New tennis courts behind Ross High School
- A new baseball/softball complex, Alumni Fields, for Ross High School
- Baseball fields for SJCC
- A new stadium shared by Ross and SJCC, named Don Paul Stadium at Harmon Field, which includes field turf, bleachers, locker rooms, team meeting areas, and restrooms
- A new wrestling facility at Ross High School
- · A new natatorium at Ross High School, shared by Ross and SJCC
- Seven new classrooms for Ross High School

Thus far, these projects have been funded with private or foundation grants. While we continue to raise funds privately, we are always exploring new ways to reach our alumni base and expand our reach to prospective donors. LEARNING ETIQUETTE

ATKINSON ELEMENTARY

Atkinson Elementary School hosted their annual Etiquette Lunch on April 28th. This is a cherished yearly event that takes place after classroom teachers instruct a lesson on Etiquette and Table Manners. The week-long event begins when the classroom teachers are given a formal invitation to the Etiquette Lunch. The invitation is read aloud to each class and the students are asked to R.S.V.P. to the event. This is a lesson in itself, teaching the students the purpose and respect of responding formally to an invitation. The written responses are made either individually or as a class and sent to Mr. Ward and Mrs. Garcia.

During the classroom lessons, students are taught valuable social skills that they can use when dining with friends, family, and in a public setting. The students are taught to chew with their mouths closed, keep their elbows off the table, ask for items to be passed instead of reaching, saying please and thank you, and conversing in a quiet manner so as to not disturb others' dining

experience around them. The cafeteria staff, along with many other Atkinson staff members, create a truly magical dining experience in the cafeteria. The lights are dimmed and the tables are lit with tea lights. Tables are nicely decorated with table cloths, place settings, and beautiful floral arrangements. The students are invited to wear their nicest outfits to school on the day of the event.

On the day of the Etiquette Lunch, students approach the "Ram Restaurant" doors where they are greeted by Hostess Mrs. Garcia. She checks the class in who had previously RSVP'd. The students receive a nice meal of fried chicken, mashed

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potatoes, applesauce, and celery and are seated. The Atkinson wait staff walks around to deliver dinner rolls, butter, and dessert cookies. Students put their table manners to good use as they use their napkins appropriately, say please and thank you, compliment the chef, and enjoy the company of their friends. At the end of the lunch, the Atkinson wait staff removes their trays from the table. This event is something the students look forward to each year and, in the process, teaches invaluable social skills and life lessons.
