Word of the Month

Honesty is the word of the month for January. People who are honest are reliable and worthy of others' confidence. Here are some ways you can help your child(ren) develop honesty:

- 1. **Reframe honesty as an act of courage.** Let your child know that it's always best to be honest, even when it feels hard to do. Telling the truth often takes courage, but will build trust.
- 2. **Honor Truthfulness.** Reminding children that it's important to be honest before asking about a situation increases the chance they will be honest. When children are honest, thank them for their honesty and work to solve the problem together.
- 3. Set limits as trust is built. Having consequences when trust is broken will help your child develop the self-discipline necessary to be trustworthy with consistency. Remember, the cost attached to learning these lessons later in life is higher.

The start of a new year is a great time to help your child set some goals for the upcoming year. Setting goals gives students something to work towards and achieving goals creates motivation to continue learning and working hard. Help your child set some goals that are meaningful to him/her. Maybe they want to memorize their math facts or learn to ride a bike. Then celebrate successes when goals are achieved.
