Please send a letter with a student or call the office if a student will have a change in how he/she typically gets home from school. We simply cannot rely on what a student says. Thank you!




Self - Respect

The word of the month to start the year is Self - Respect. Self - Respect is pride and confidence in oneself; a feeling that one is behaving with honor and dignity. We show respect by the thoughts, words and actions we choose. Here are some ways to instill respect in your child(ren):

- 1. **Practice self-control when you think your child is being disrespectful.** Be a good role model of what empathy, self-control and self respect look like and your child will naturally model you.
- 2. **Teach problem solving alternatives when a child is being disrespectful.** Many times disrespect comes from a lack of control over big emotions. Teach your child coping skills and problem solving strategies to curb disrespectful behavior.
- 3. **Use kind and firm discipline to teach, not punish.** Positive discipline is proven to be more effective in establishing respectful behavior as opposed to punitive strategies. Setting firm boundaries and sticking to them are keys to successful discipline.
- 4. **Let your children know they are important and their feelings are important.** Teach them to studies to others.
